### Preparing to Wrestle with Esau (32:1-23)

#### Vv. 1-2

I. Who meets Jacob after Laban and him part ways, how many were there, and what do you suppose happened?

### Vv. 3-12

- 2. In these passages, what are the four sections of the action?
- 3. What is Jacob hoping for with Esau? How does this take us all the way back to the end of ch. 27?
- 4. How are the specifics of Jacob's prayer a recitation of the promises made to him by God?

BONUS: How does fear sometimes positively bring us to prayer?

### Vv. 13-23

- 5. How does v. 20 summarize what Jacob tries to do in these passages?
- 6. "Servant...Lord...pacify...receive." How is this, interestingly, a reversal of roles promised to Jacob and Esau? And does it hold any future meaning or fulfillment?

## **Wrestling with God Instead (32:24-32)**

- 7. Read this section as a table group. What kind of questions arise from the text?
- 8. How is Jacob "wounded" in this wrestling match?
- 9. What does Jacob desire from this wrestling match, and what does he receive?

BONUS: What's the point of God wrestling with Jacob? How does it make more sense when considering the grander story of God's salvation through Jesus?

- 11. How does Jacob show deference to Esau?
- 12. How are we ALL shocked by their reunion?

- 13. What is Jacob's central desire in these verses (hint: the Hebrew word "khane")?
- 14. Is Jacob deceiving Esau in these verses, or are these "polite negotiations"?
