- 11. In previous verses, Judah was dealing with a "prostitute." Now the language changes. How does it change and why do you think that is?
- 12. How is Judah kind of a coward in all of this?

- 13. What is Judah's response to Tamar's pregnancy (ironically, see Leviticus 20:10ff)? What does he assume?
- 14. What is Tamar's response to Judah? What does she prove about herself that comes out of Judah's own lips?

15. Who is born to Tamar and how? Why is the line of Judah important?

BONUS: Read Matthew 1:1-6. What is ironic about Jesus' genealogy of forefathers?

BONUS: Ultimately, how does Judah do the right thing for the wrong reason? How does this encourage you; how does it make you uneasy?
